The Lord's Supper

In the Lord's Supper, the Lord gives us His Body and His Blood with the bread and the wine. Because receiving Communion together publicly declares that we are in full community with each another, if you would like to receive the Lord's Supper at *Zion*, please chat with Pastor before the service to find out what Scripture teaches and why we believe it.

If you need gluten-free bread, let Pastor know. The light-colored cups in the middle of the tray are alcohol-free, if you prefer that.

Parents of Little Ones:

Welcome to **Zio** and relax! God gives our children energy to explore the world and He loves it!

The activity and sounds of your children prove that the Church is where life happens.

As children wiggle, giggle, and talk during Church, they are learning how to worship and that God loves them *just as they are*.

How do you help them learn to worship? Well,

- come to worship each week,
- sit closer to the front so they can see more and be distracted less,
- explain why we do what we do when we are doing it,
- sing the songs and pray the prayers, because they learn how to worship by copying you, and
- if your little one needs a break, slip out when you need to, but please come back after a few minutes.

^c Making **the Sign of the Cross** was a Church-wide practice by AD 150 as described by Tertullian, an ancient Church leader. Even Martin Luther said it is a good thing to do as we remember that we have put on Christ—*Romans 13. Galatians 3*

Gift #2: Our First Scripture Reading

Acts 8:26-40, from around AD 35

In the Season of Easter, instead of our first reading coming from the Old Testament, we sample the Book of Acts, the history of the Early Christian Church.

Through sharing the good news about Jesus, another person was included in the Kingdom.

²⁶An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Rise and go toward the South, to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." This is a desert place ²⁷and he rose and went and there was an Ethiopian, a eunuch, a court official of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, who was in charge of all her treasure. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸and was returning, seated in his chariot, and he was reading the prophet Isaiah ²⁹and the Spirit^a said to Philip, "Go over and join this chariot," ³⁰so Philip ran to him and heard him reading Isaiah the prophet and asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" ³¹And he said, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to come up and sit with him. ³²Now, the passage of the Scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep, He was led to the slaughter and like a lamb before its shearer is silent so He opens not His mouth. ³³In His humiliation, justice was denied Him. Who can describe His generation? For His life is taken away from the Earth." Isaiah 53:7–8, from around 725 BC

³⁴And the eunuch said to Philip, "About whom, I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" ³⁵Then Philip opened his mouth and beginning with this Scripture he told him **the good news** about Jesus ³⁶and, as they were going along the road they came to some water and the eunuch said, "See, here is water! What prevents me from being Baptized?" ³⁸And he commanded the chariot to stop and they both went down into the water, Philip and the eunuch, and he Baptized him ³⁹and when they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord carried Philip away and the eunuch saw him no more and went on his way rejoicing, ⁴⁰but Philip found himself at Azotus and, as he passed through, he preached **the gospel** to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

^a This "**Spirit**" is not just some sort of "spirituality" but is God the Holy Spirit, the Third Person in the Trinity that is God, who offers to dwell inside of us to give us hope, joy, faith, Heaven, and so much more.

Gift #3: A Reading from the Epistlesa

God calls us to show practical, tangible love to others.

⁷Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God and whoever loves has been born of God and knows God. ⁸Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love. ⁹In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent His only Son into the world, so that we might live through Him. ¹⁰In this is love, not that we have loved God but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins. ¹¹Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another.

Each week, we share different parts of the Bible to give us the opportunity to regularly hear from parts of God's Word which we may not visit on our own. Our readings follow the "Revised Common Lectionary," a schedule of readings shared by 29.5% (97,800,000) of all Christians in America and 64.4% (1,417,638,000) of all Christians throughout the world, so the readings we hear today are heard in most congregations worldwide!

^a An "Epistle" is a letter. This is from a letter John wrote to Christians throughout the world and to us as well.

b "Alleluia" is a word in Hebrew, the original language of the Old Testament, which means, "Praise Yahweh!" inviting us to do just that.

^a "Gospel" is an ancient word meaning "good news" and has come to mean a biography of Jesus.

^a The words of this prayer come from Jesus Himself, as He taught His followers how to pray. We use older sounding words, such as "art" and "Thy," because these are the same words which the English-speaking Church has used to pray this prayer since the Bible translation of William Tyndale in AD 1526. We could use updated words, but this is guite a precious heritage—that we have prayed these words throughout the English-speaking Church for 500 years!



^a "**Sanctus**" means "Holy" in Latin, which was the primary language of the Church in Europe from around AD 395 until AD 1520, when many congregations began to worship God in the locally spoken languages, such as German and English. In the Sanctus, the word "**Hosanna**" means "please save us" in Hebrew, the original language of the Old Testament.

^a "Pax Domini" means "The peace of the Lord" in Latin, which was the primary language of the Church in Europe from around AD 395 until AD 1520. This "The peace of the Lord be with you" greeting has been used daily and weekly throughout the Church since Jesus greeted His closest followers on the evening of the first Easter, April 5, AD 33—John 20:21.

Why do some people do the Sign of the Cross?

At the parts of the service marked with a "*" you may notice that some people draw a cross on themselves from forehead to stomach, then from shoulder to shoulder. You may find yourself doing it! This has been a common way for people to remind themselves that what they are hearing is for them. In a sense, they are putting on Christ. (Romans 13, Galatians 3)

The Sign of the Cross has been drawn by Christians on themselves in different ways for a very, very long time. This was such a common and ancient practice that Tertullian, a Church Father born around the year AD 160 said, "We Christians wear out our foreheads with the sign of the cross." It is easy to see why even Martin Luther encouraged people to make the Sign of the Cross in the 1500s!

Some go from head to stomach then left shoulder to right shoulder. Others go from head to stomach then right shoulder to left shoulder. Some draw the cross on their foreheads, on their lips, and then over their hearts. No matter how you draw it, you are wearing a cross, like those who have come before us all the way back to the earliest Church and it is hard to complain about that!

Have you ever wondered why we have or do something that we do? Let Pastor Know you are wondering, so we may all learn why we do what we do!


